



## TTS BETTER TO BE RICH AND HEALTHY THAN SICK & POOR.

Notes on the Natural Foods Store by Cash Sales

One warm day in the Haight I had a drink of of Hansen's Red Rasberry juice. It was too good. When I moved to Santa Cruz, I was really glad to see some good food markets. My whole hody was thirsty...not to mention my mind.

I purchased goods from both natural food stores, but my association with the F.S.D. brought me in contact with Hank Turley, long-haired, rag-tagged, thoughtful, divinely-inspired, bicycling, porsche-driving owner and operator of the Natural Food Store at Soquel and Water Streets.

Hank stopped eating meat at 22, three years ago. He saw the pressing need for good foods and nutritional education throughout world culture. He felt he had to do as much as he could to meet these needs and to meet his own desires for a creative profession.

Acting upon his life purpose and capitalized by a \$5000 loan from his family, Hank opened his store in the summer of 1969. For a short period, Hank also owned Staff of Life Bakery, but has sold out for a substantial loss. The retail store fared quite well, however. So much so that in the last few weeks, Hank purchased Pacific Grain and Grocery.

A most astonishing recent development was the nurchase (to be consummated October 1) of Matural Foods Store by New Age Natural Foods of San Francisco. Fred Rohe, the founder of OM (See FSD issue #12) is the president of New Age. Hank becomes a stockholder and store manager for New Age. Stock will be offered to the general public sometime next year.

New Age now has stores in San Francisco, San Anselmo, Palo Alto, and Santa Cruz. Planned expansions for the next few years include 10,000 square feet stores for Santa Cruz and Carmel. The present Natural Foods Store will be turned into a grainery. And opening for the New Age Natural Foods Store is set for Thrusday, September 10, 1970 at 817 Pacific.

The first benefits of New Age's takeover will be a 5-10% reduction in many prices as New Age initiates volume purchasing and centralized distribution. (This may not seem like much, but it is all too painfully evident that there are few sources of good food and medicinal ointments, etc., on this planet) The grainery to be opened will also bring 5-10% reduction in all of the many grains and flours to be milled. An independent research lab will conduct weekly tests on all produce (fruits and vegetables) to insure quality.

It is New Age's goal to bring large quantities of good food to the public at prices competitive with those of the plastic markets. Monetarily, New Age will receive 2% of the sales of its stores. From this it will pay the salaries of its staff, explore new ventures, operate its systems, and pay dividends to its shareholders...if it is successful. Knowing Hank and drinkin' red raspberry juice, I think it probably will be.


Heavy business trip. Well, Hank's a Capricorn-generally noted for their business acumen. But Hank doesn't look at it quite that way, as he's behind a trip very few are: feeding you from the Garden of Eden. If it means dealing with lawyers, CPA's, crazy old folks, rip-off artists, radicals, and newspaper men, that's okay. It's still got to be done.

Hank feels that God has a plan for this planet. He believes that if he does not fit in with this plan he will be replaced...by someone else who is in tune with the cosmic plan. So he doesn't think too much about being a capitalist, a monopolist, or an heir. He knows that he will get from life what he gives it. He gives it steady work and a good mind.

Pight now in Santa Cruz, September, 1970, Hank Turley is feeding a lot of people. Doing a job no-body else has done. For this he is to be thanked and supported.

## REMEMBER

There's a utorian world out here yet to be lived, where nothing is so solidified that it can be owned. A lot of people will be living on farms, feeding themselves directly, and others will be fantastic 'cities of the future." Everybody will be havin' fun, rockin', laughin', thinkin', and eatin' good. Hank Turley can't give us that reality. He can only suggest that we find some way to get involved, and get it for ourselves! At least then we'll be doing something right.



## coastal vidation:

This has got to be one of the greenest, most beautiful coastlines going. The people that gather here are children of nature. They wear their hair long. They tend to be non-violent. Many of the Santa Cruz people are into a life cycle experience knowing as "surfing."

Surfing in Santa Cruz is different than anywhere else in the world. A look at a coastal map will reveal a tremendous variety of bays, inlets, beaches and points. Whatever the direction of the swell, we have a spot or two that can produce righteous waves. Surfing fits implicitly into the Santa Cruz environment. Riding a wave is a perfect example of man flowing with nature's energy. The surfer takes nothing from the balance of natural forces. Through his happiness, he adds to the joy in the world around him. He creates pleasure. He communicates directly with nature.

I've surfed in Southern California, Mexico, and Hawaii this last year. Santa Cruz offers more than all of them put together. Southern California has become one uptight stretch of smog-covered freeway from San Diego to Los Angeles. Santa Barbara still offers a measure of natural beauty but being only 11/2 hours from L.A., the crowds there are becoming unbearable. Of course if you want to surf

Santa Barbara on a steady basis, you've got to dig floating around in crude oil. As far as Mexico is concerned, forget it. Nixon and his Mexican narc force have made' life south of the border impossible for everyone except police cadets and Oklahoma marines on leave.

Hawaii, once the place to go for people really into surfing can best be described as total insanity. The waves there are still beautiful. They throw out from the top and are steep and fast. But for that, you must share the water with the local Mokes and Waikiki waders. If you've got long hair, the island boys would just as soon run over you as look at you. Mostly, they prefer fisticuffs on Saturday night. Primo is the only acceptable high. Several places on Maui and Oahu are known more for their staph infected water than their waves.

Relatively speaking, Santa Cruz presents something close to Paradise. Its great to hear someone yell 'Have you got it?" as you push off onto a big green wall at the Lane. Blasting out from under the lip, people are yelling from the cliff and in the water. You can feel the good vibes everywhere... even in the electric cold of the water. This my idea of what surfing should be....forever. Some people think that all this is coming to an end. They say in a few years what is left of our water will be totally polluted and regulated.

If we look to the past and what has happened elsewhere, there is little hope. Surfers characteristically avoid group confrontation. They've sat by and watched city councils and local politicians legislate and enforce reams of discriminatory laws. Even here we paddle day after day through the brown toilet water of "Sewer Pipel" They've remained silent as industry pours tons of waste and filth into their water. Is it possible that Santa Cruz can go a different way than Santa Monica and Newport and Maui? (Did you know that hitchhiking is illegal on Maui?) We have the tremendous energy and resources of the U.C. people on our side. We have the surf shop owners. They are certainly aware of the changes that Santa Cruz is going through. We have the non-surfing youth of Santa Cruz. They are beautiful people. Like us they are seeking a better life. One closer to nature as man was meant to live. We have ourselves.....

I would like to think that we do have a chance. Santa Cruz is awakening. We have many people, who are ready, and willing, to let themselves be heard. Official regulation of Santa Cruz surfing is still minimal. The bay is only partially polluted. It can be reversed. The coast of Santa Cruz deserves our commitment. Besides if the industrial, legislative polluters win here, there might not be anyplace left to go...... Think it over, brothers and sisters.
